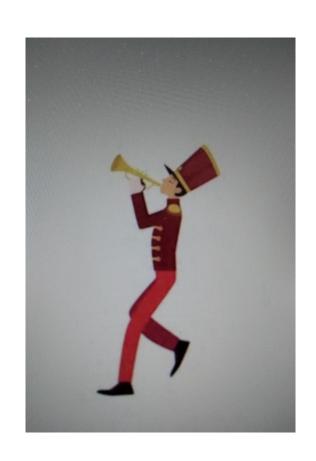
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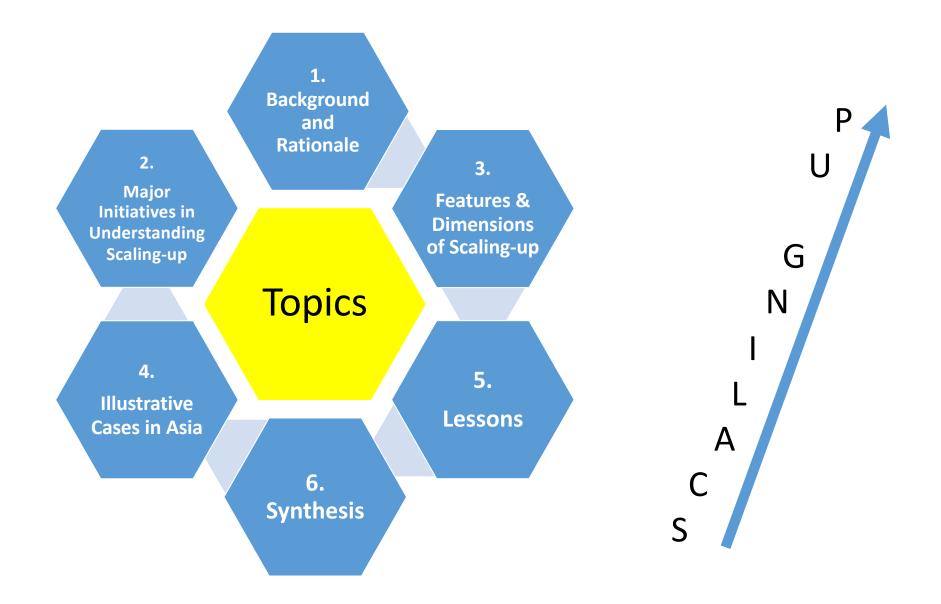
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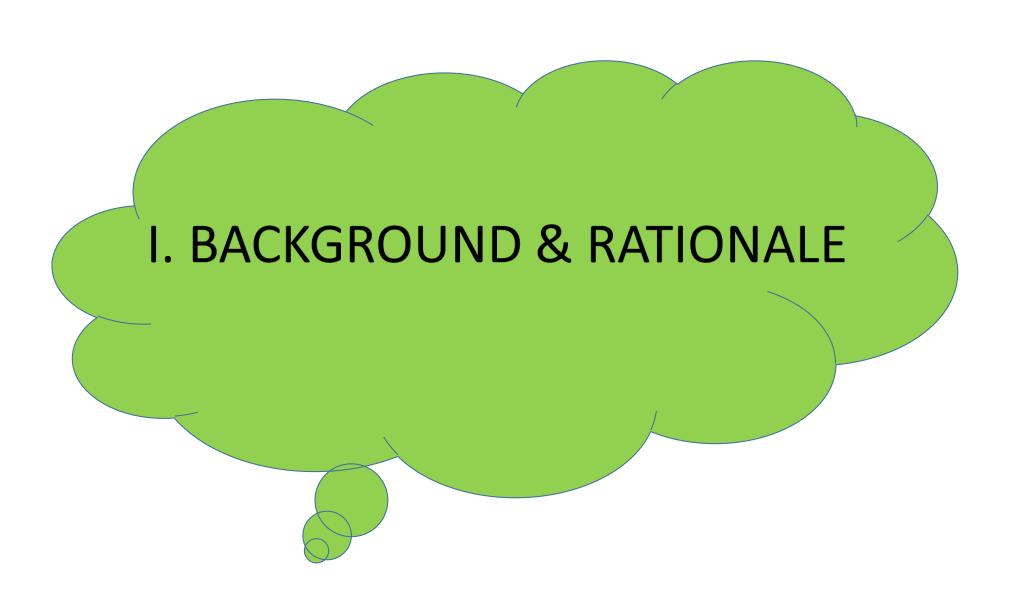
Purpose of presentation

To 'trumpet' the issue of scaling-up - as an instrument of achieving improved lives for the greatest number of people more quickly - by highlighting:

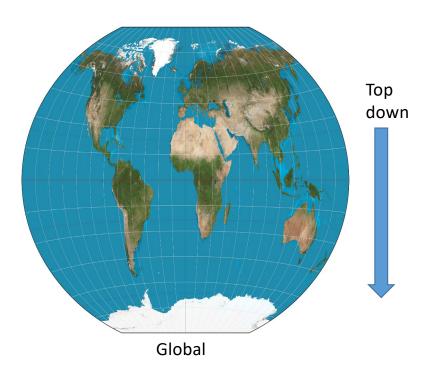
- Importance in bringing about outcomes and impacts;

- How can we make it happen in our work.



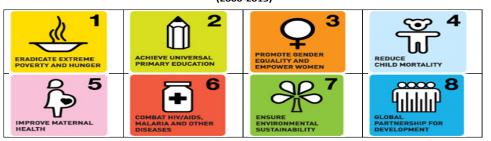




GLOBAL DEVELOPMENT **PERSPECTIVE**

NGOs' Value Addition in Development Sector

- Since late 1970s, NGOs played increased prominent role in the development sector.
- Widely praised for their strengths as innovative and grassroots driven organizations.
- Possess desire and capacity for participatory and people centered forms of development.
- Filled gaps left by the failure of states across the developing world in meeting the needs of their poorest citizens (Banks and Hulme, 2012).
- ✓ NGOs served as development alternative, offering innovative and people-centered approaches to service delivery, advocacy and empowerment.

NGOs' Limitations in Development Sector

- Limited resources
- Small champions
- Spread-out 'sparks'
 - Sustainability
- Outside mainstream
- NGOs and Governments are 'strange bedfellows'
 - Etc.



Scaling-up Initiatives & Milestones

- 1.0 Late 1990s Recognition on the importance of proper planning and management of scaling-up in Sustainable Agriculture by:
 - a. Consultative Group on International Agricultural Research-Non-Government Organization (CGIAR-NGO) Committee
 - b. Global Forum for Agricultural Research (GFAR)
 - C. International Institute of Rural Reconstruction (IIRR)

1.1 Oct 22-23, 1999 = Washington Workshop: "Scaling-up Sustainable Agriculture Initiatives"

Focus:

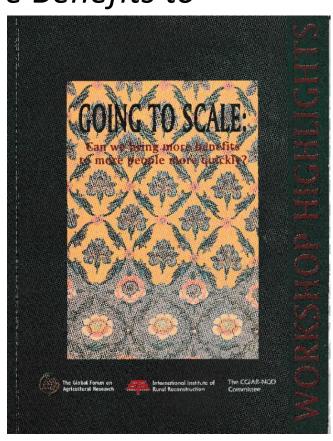
- Principles explaining success of initiatives at the local levels for extrapolation to wider/higher levels;
- Scaling-up methodologies/approaches; and
- Obstacles to scaling-up and how to overcome them.

1.2 April 10-14, 2000 = Philippine Workshop: "Going to Scale: Can We Bring More Benefits to

More People More Quickly?"

Goal:

To generate guideposts and list of available & emerging tools for development stakeholders, particularly SA practitioners, for use in the scaling-up efforts.

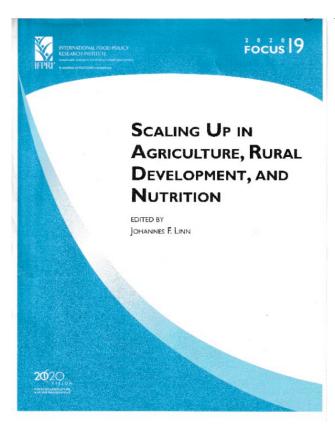


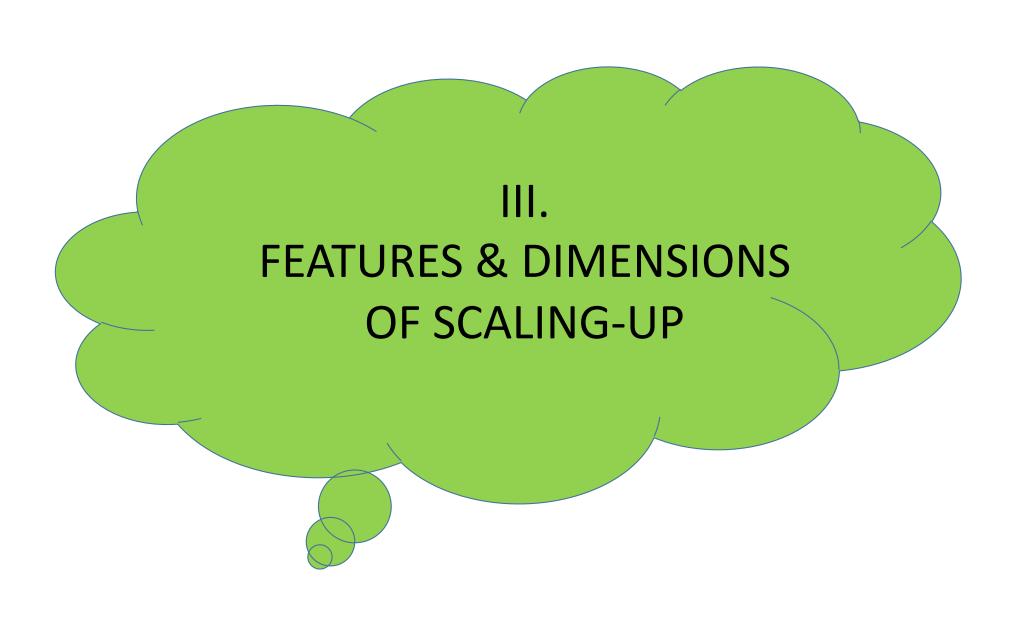

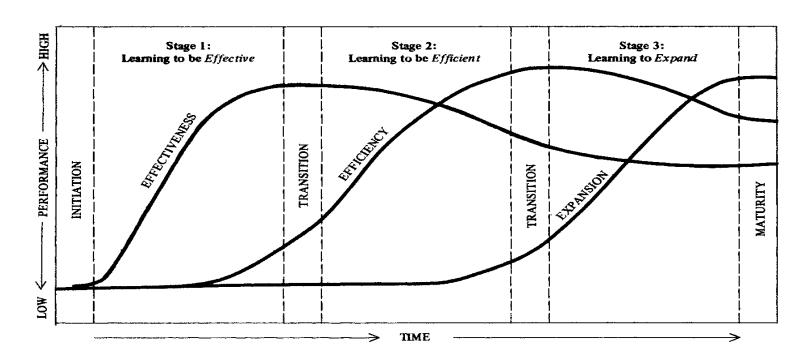
Scaling-up Defined:

- 1. "Bringing more quality benefits to more people over a wider geographical area more quickly, more equitably and more lastingly" (IIRR, 2000).
- 2. "Taking successful <u>projects</u>, <u>programs or policies</u> and expanding, adapting and sustaining them in different ways over time for greater development impact" (Hartmann and Linn, 2007).
- 3. 'Expansion, replication and adaptation of successful development <u>interventions</u> to new and different context, for greater and sustained impact' (Fan and Pandya-Lorch, 2012).

Building Blocks of Scaling-up (3)

(Hartmann and Linn, 2007; Linn, 2012)

1. Vision = intentional design to go beyond the pilot at the outset



(Korten, 1980. Community Organization and Rural Development: A Learning Process Approach)

2. Drivers:

- 2.1 <u>Innovative ideas and models</u> an idea or model that works at a small scale.
- 2.2 <u>Leader/champion</u> Visionary leaders or champions
- 2.3 External catalysts Political and economic crises or pressure from outside actors (e.g., donors, NGOs, etc.)
- 2.4 <u>Incentives and accountability</u> rewards, competitions, political pressure, community demand, peer reviews, & independent evaluations.

3. Spaces to grow:

- 3.1 <u>Fiscal/financial space</u> Fiscal and financial resources.
- 3.2 Policy space Policy and legal framework.
- 3.3 <u>Market space</u> Economic and market opportunities & benefits.
- 3.4 <u>Institutional capacity space</u> Organizational, staff & institutional capacity.

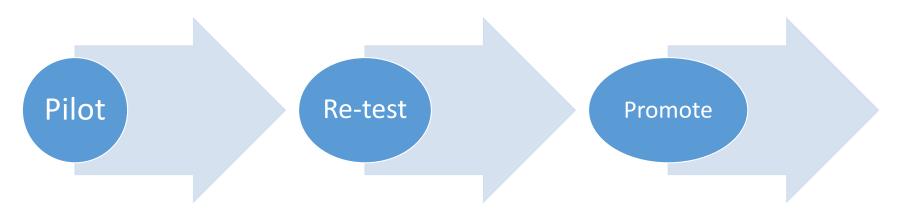
Spaces to grow...

- 3.5 Political space political support for a scaled-up intervention.
- 3.6 <u>Natural resource/environmental space</u> impact on natural resources and the environment (i.e., harmful effects mitigated & beneficial impacts promoted).
- 3.7 <u>Cultural space</u> cultural & local practices and norms
- 3.8 <u>Partnership space</u> mobilization of partners & stakeholders.
- 3.9 <u>Learning space</u> knowledge about what does and doesn't work harnessed through M&E, knowledge sharing, and training.

Pathways for Scaling-up

(Hartmann and Linn, 2007; Linn, 2012)

= sequence of steps that need to be taken to ensure that a successful pilot or practice is taken from its experimental stage through subsequent stages to the scale ultimately judged to be appropriate.

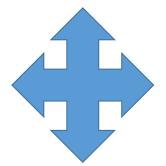


Pathways.....

1. **Geographic** – expansion of services to more clients in a given geographic area.



2. Horizontal – replication from one geographical area to another.



3. Vertical – moving from a local or provincial engagement to a nationwide engagement.

- **4.** Functional addition of programmatic areas of engagement.
